

- be near the site of Rockcliffe toll house.<sup>77</sup>
- 1865 Bacup Local Board. Naming of streets, this would abolish many streets having a different name every hundred yards<sup>78</sup>
- 1865 Rossendale Union Gas Act.
- 1865 St.Saviors Church built.<sup>79</sup> Began at Higher Rockcliffe Mill Bacup.<sup>80</sup>
- 1865 J.M.Holt Esq.is about to build a new road from his lodge gates to Newchurch Rd.This will be a boon to people attending St.Saviors Church.(Note:this would entail bridging over the river Irwell.The Bridge can be seen from the river bed.) The road is now named Park Rd.<sup>80</sup>
- 1865 The Bacup Times began. Last issue November 1965.Other newspapers have been published in Bacup q.v.News letter no:75 April 1973 by K.F.Bowden A.L.A.
- 1865 No:1 Branch of Bacup Co-op opened at Weir.<sup>52</sup>
- 1866 The 1812 Chapel of Ebenezer changed into a school.<sup>55</sup>
- 1866 No:2 Branch of the Bacup Co-op. opened at Britannia.<sup>52</sup>
- 1867 428,374 spindles and 11,073 looms in Bacup.<sup>30</sup>
- 1867 Opening of the Market Hall.
- 1867 Heald Wesleyan Chapel built.Later destroyed by fire,1932. Closed 1935. 1925 Unveiling of memorial tablet to old School at Heald.<sup>81</sup>
- 1868 No:3 Branch of the Bacup Co-op. opened at Lee Mill.<sup>52</sup>
- 1868 No:4 Branch of the Bacup Co-op.opened at Change.<sup>52</sup>
- 1868 Munn & Co.Old Brewery Bacup. Bacup Old Brewery to be sold by auction South Street,Bacup,1874.<sup>52</sup> see <sup>34</sup>
- 1868 Bacup Conservative Co-operative Society formed,known..... locally as the Blue Co.,their buildings still remain on the east side of King Street.<sup>53</sup>
- 1868 The Murphy Riots in Bacup,March/May.<sup>84</sup>
- 1868 Thomas Newbigging(1833-1914)Published the History of the Forest of Rossendale. His second edition published 1893.
- 1869 The Wine & Beer house Act,condemned many beer houses in Bacup.At that date there had been as many as 75 named.Not all in business at one period.<sup>20</sup>
- 1869 DS.Olive House,New Line,<sup>18</sup>. Built by Joshua Hoyle (1810-1900) also builder of Olive Mill with Benjamin Crapper late of Broadclough Hall,1860.
