

- 1911 Bacup to Rochdale Light Railway opened.
- 1911 Building of tram shed Rochdale Rd. Demolished 1972.
- 1911 Bacup's Labour Exchange opened at 16, Market St. after the first World War it moved to the Mechanics and was once housed in a wooden building in South St. its present location was erected in 1930
- 1911 Stacksteads Working Mens Club Bowling Green opened 12 Aug
- 1911 Carlton House, Todmorden Rd. made into two houses, created in 1866, 7th. Aug.
- 1911 Sept. James Maden Holt (1829-1911) died at Stubbylee Hall. He left an estate of £72,071. At one period, Stubbylee estate ran from Cowpe to Shawforth, & then to Sharneyford.
- 1912 Work on the New Drill Hall for the Territorials is proceeding. Aug. 1913 Opening of the Drill Hall postponed until 10th. May. 1893
- 1912 King George V. clock started. 6th. Dec.
- 1912 River Irwell culverted from Bull's Head to St. Johns School
- 1912 The Maden Memorial unveiled & clock on King George V. started
- 1913 King George V & Queen Mary visited Bacup.
- 1913 The date of an indenture of Marks & Spencer Ltd. To hold from the first of January 1914 for a term of fourteen years, for the premises numbered 8, Bridge Street, Bacup. The lease was terminated on the first of January 1921. 1888
An advertisement in the press: Girls wanted, regular employment, apply M&S Ltd. Bridge St. Bacup. Dated Mar. 1914.
- 1913 Demise of the Stacksteads Cricket Club. They rented a field from Messrs. Munn of Stacksteads Mill, later became the Rec'
- 1914 Bacup had 25 cotton mills. 90
- 1914 Alderman J.H. Maden J.P.C.C. (1862-1920) appointed High Sheriff of Lancashire.
- 1914 340,452 spindles and 9,749 looms. 25 Cotton Mills.
- 1914 Stubbylee Park purchased by Bacup Corporation.
- 1914 Stubbylee Hall purchased by Bacup Corporation.
- 1914 Moorlands Estate of the late Edward Hoyle J.P. conveyed to Bacup Corporation, as a park.
- 1914 Bacup population 22,000.
